End of Year Giving - Church Office Closed Dec. 26 thru Jan. 1

Please be aware that the Church Office will close at 5 p.m. Friday, December 23 and reopen Monday, January 2 at 10 a.m. All 2022 donations must be hand delivered by 5 p.m. Friday, December 23 OR postmarked no later than December 31, 2022 except for those placed in the Sunday offering plate on December 25, 2022. Any donations not postmarked 2022 must be considered a 2023 contribution by the church. Please plan your end of year charitable contributions accordingly.

What is a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)?

What does it have to do with me?

What does it have to do with First Presbyterian? A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a direct transfer from an IRA to a qualified charity, and FPC is a qualified charity. Only individuals who are 70 ½ or older may make QCDs. QCDs count toward the required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year in which the QCD is made. Unlike withdrawals from an IRA, a QCD is not taxable income to you and unlike other contributions to the church, a QCD is not tax-deductible for you. Nevertheless, a QCD can be advantageous for a charitably-minded IRA owner and the charity she/he selects. To execute a QCD to First Presbyterian Church, instruct your IRA trustee or custodian to make a transfer from your IRA directly to First Presbyterian Church. You can use a QCD to pay your pledge and/or make a special gift. In any case, please alert Mary Beth at the church office that a QCD is coming and any special instructions. Upon receipt, the church will provide you with an acknowledgment of the nondeductible QCD contribution. "This is the day the Lord acted; we will rejoice and celebrate in it!"

Psalm 118:24 CEB

On my second day as your new interim pastor, I traveled to Newkirk with Rev. Jenny and 3 Elders to celebrate the life of the FPC of Newkirk as they deed their properties to a new and upcoming congregation while closing their own. Rev. Dr. Gordon Edwards, our General Presbyter and a previous pastor of ours, gave the homily with a combination of scriptures throughout the Bible which spoke of hope for new life in the face of death. "This is the day that the Lord is creating," Gordon said. "God is still creating." I still had in my ears words from Jenny's sermon on my first Sunday with you, as she reminded us of how God spoke through Isaiah to say, "Look, I am creating, I am doing a new thing." Both of them were reflecting the generative nature of God throughout time. For the Great God of the Cosmos that we worship and serve set time into motion and continues to interact in our present and our future.

When the Psalmist and Isaiah expressed their certainty of God's activity, they had no physical evidence in their present. They were surrounded by war, death, destruction of buildings, famine, disease and other great disparities which discouraged God's people to the point of wondering, "Where is God now? Who will deliver us?" The Psalms were written down and verbally passed from generation to generation in song to remind the people that God continues to create and form each day for our personal and corporate benefit, all in God's delight. Isaiah and other prophets spoke to the people and their scribes recorded their words so that generation after generation could envision a God who intends to bring their salvation and provide for them on earth and in heaven. These same words comfort us in our grief and disbelief by calling us to gratitude and faith while we wait in the unknown.

We may not be surrounded by war or destruction, but we have experienced worldwide loss and disparity over the last several years. Many of us have experienced first hand the tragedies caused by pandemic, and we all have layers of ambiguous grief and trauma as we continue to carry the pain of others that we witnessed. Like the Psalmist and the Prophet Isaiah, we are called to name where we see God at work and where we see God creating a new thing, so that the generations surrounding us can believe in the faithfulness of our Everlasting God.

I am here to hold space for us in a season of generation—God is generating new things in the seen and unseen, and God is speaking through the youngest and oldest generations among us. From the generation of compassion and grace to the generation of funds and repairs, from the great generation of baby boomers to generation z and alpha, our knowledge of God blossoms like a rose bush revealing more beauty with each blossom, carrying history, present and future in each moment. I see my role as a mirror to help you see one another and see Jesus more fully in the world around us. I will be asking questions and I will be listening, but mostly, I am here to celebrate what God is doing among you, and help you to name that for yourself. For this is the day that God is generating, let us rejoice and be glad in it.

Sent by God, Just for Me: A Stephen Ministry Story

"I was 26, newly divorced, living far away from family and friends, and dealing with a lot of guilt, shame, and low self-esteem. Was I a total failure? Would anybody ever want me? Was God condemning me because of my divorce?

I found a new church and made some friends, but still struggled. It seemed like all my church friends were perfect, happy, and full of faith—while I was flawed, gloomy, and full of doubts. When I shared some of this with my pastor, she suggested a Stephen Minister.

Before I met my Stephen Minister, I was worried she would judge and reject me once she learned about my past and got to know the real me. But she didn't. She was patient, loving, and accepting. I truly believe she was sent by God just for me.

We got together weekly. She'd ask me questions, get me talking, and then listen as I shared my struggles and doubts. She showed me God's love even when I didn't feel it. Over time, her faithful care helped me to see that perhaps I wasn't such a terrible person after all. Through her loving care, I began to think that if God loved me, then maybe I could love myself too.

After a while, I got to a better place emotionally, and our Stephen Ministry relationship ended. A few years later, I remarried and had a miscarriage, and she was there for me again as a Stephen Minister, providing the care and support I needed. We now live over a thousand miles apart—but she will always hold a special place in my heart.

If you're dealing with any kind of difficulty, if you're struggling with faith questions or doubts, if you're wondering whether you are a worthy person, then I encourage you to consider getting a Stephen Minister.

It just might be that God already has a special one picked out just for you."

The above was shared by Stephen Ministries St. Louis. An individual at a staff member's church anonymously shared a powerful story about how a Stephen Minister made a profound difference in her life when she went through some difficult times. She gave her permission to share her story with Stephen Ministry congregations worldwide.

Advent 2022: From Generation to Generation


Our Advent liturgy will feature Words for Worship from the series by A Sanctified Art entitled, From Generation to Generation. The artists took their inspiration from Mary's song of protest and praise: "Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name. His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation." (Luke 1: 48b-50) Despite the challenges and vulnerability she faced, Mary could glimpse the scale and scope of the good news she was part of bringing forth. This good news transcends time and space—it was and is bigger than just her. Christ is coming for collective liberation: God's redemption is at work for years to come. Therefore, the promise is meant to be lived out and passed on from generation to generation.

We are invited to look at the characters in our scriptures and wonder: What did each character pass on or contribute? How did each character participate in God's liberation and love? Which characters try to thwart God's justice and what can we learn from them? What is our role now? What is our generation's task? What will we carry forth, and what should we leave behind? The root word of "generation" is "gen" meaning "origin" or "birth." Our theme is also a call to action: what are we being called to generate or bring forth? What have your ancestors and those who have come before you passed on for you to continue? Who are the spiritual elders in your community who planted the seeds for the things that are now blooming? What seeds are you planting for the future? From Generation to Generation reminds us of the ways our lives, histories, actions, and stories are interconnected and woven together. In the midst of narratives, policies, and rhetoric designed to divide us, what does it look like to practice belonging to one another? The work of God is always unfolding— in and through us. This Advent season, how will we carry it forth?





Pastor Jenny will lead the Bible Study, Celebrating Sabbath: Accepting God's Gift of Rest and Delight, Lesson Four: Sabbath and Surrender. Following the lesson the women will participate in the Fellowship of the Least Coin "noisy offering" which brings about reconciliation, peace and justice throughout the world through grants given to projects, scholarships, and relief efforts that have been supported by prayers and least coins.

In November the women participated in the Thank Offering with a collection of \$303. Received in the fall each year, it gives women a tangible way to express their gratitude for the special blessings in their lives. Thank Offering Grants range from \$5,000 to \$50,000. At least 40 % of the offering funds health ministries. Since 1988, Presbyterian Women has granted more than \$26 million to nearly 1,700 different projects worldwide through the Thank Offering.

BEHIND THE WALLS: A TRUSTEES UPDATE

Expect to see work on our Church Campus roof over the coming months. Our lead contractor, Mid-Continental Restoration Company, began the roofing project on November 21 and hopes to have everything completed by the end of the year. Sub-contractors include Guaranteed Roofing, Inc. and also Byers Company. This will be a project totalling \$252,765. Our claim for hail damage with our insurance company (Church Mutual) will cover about 75% of this expense when recoverable depreciation is included. We have had several leaks following rain events over the past several years. Most of our roof shingles on Fellowship Hall are past their useful and expected life and these will be replaced. The total project will include new shingles on most of the campus as well as decking and guttering/drain installation. We have valuable equipment and assets under our roof. Certainly, we have many programs that serve our Congregation as well as the community. We are excited to improve and enhance the roof protecting our place of worship and the many programs in service to our Mission.

One of the ways the work of the Trustees supports the outreach missions of First Presbyterian is through equipment maintenance in both the Fellowship Hall commercial kitchen and the Hospitality Area kitchen. In the last two years with the generous contributions from Presbyterian Women we have replaced the large freezer and the heated holding/proofing cabinet. However, for keeping everything functional we have a maintenance contract with twice a year inspections of all heating/cooling equipment. In addition Building Supervisor Vickie Foust completes routine cleaning of kitchen equipment and tools. If you find anything not functioning in the kitchen or encounter problems, please notify Andrea Arquitt.
